Noxious plants are never to be used in any Division of this Flower Show. Texas Noxious Plants are listed on the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service.



Flower Show General Rules

All Exhibitors are Requested to READ the RULES of this Schedule Very Carefully.

1. This Flower Show conforms to the standards established by National Garden Club, Inc. (NGC). The *Handbook for Flower Shows* (HB), 2017 edition, with revisions printed in *The National Gardener* magazine (TNG) is the authority for all issues not covered by the schedule, which is the Law of the Show.
2. Set-up and Staging will be Wednesday afternoon, November 30, 2022 from 1:00 to 2:00 p.m.
3. Entries in each division are open to members of Dallas Council of Garden Clubs of District X, Texas.
4. Exhibit entry tags are available from the Chairman of each Division at the November 3rd DCGC meeting at the Discovery Gardens of Fair Park.
5. **Be sure each entry is properly labeled, either typed with water-proof ink, or with pencil, and ready to place. Mailing address labels are also acceptable.** There are no prep rooms available. Exhibitors are requested to bring list of all entries with the required entry card information on the day of the show.

Entries Schedule:

2:00 - 4:00 p.m. Wednesday November 30, 2022. All members entries will be received.

8:00 – 9:30 a.m. Thursday, December 1, 2022. All members entries will be received.

10:00 – 10:30 a.m.- Judges coffee and instruction in Hospitality Room upstairs.

10:30 – 12:30 noon - Judging in the Grand Hall.

12:30 – 1:30 p.m. - Judges Luncheon in Hospitality Room.

1:00 – 4:00 p.m. - Flower Show open to the public. Exhibits may not be removed before 4:00 p.m..

4:00 – 4:45 p.m. - Members remove exhibits and dismantle the show.

6. Any exhibit entered late (after 9:30 a.m.) on December 1, 2022 shall be marked “Not for Competition”.
7. Bring exhibits to the East (Left) side door of the Grand Hall. **Do not block the driveway! Move your car immediately** after bringing exhibits into the Grand Hall.
8. The Classification Chairman for each division checks exhibits for conformity to the schedule prior to judging. Final determination for conformance is the judge’s responsibility.
9. The General Chairman and the Classification Chairmen for each division are available during the judging for possible consultations. They, along with the judges and clerks, are the only personnel allowed in the room during judging.
10. The decisions of the judges is final. Awards may be withheld if not merited
11. There must be an emphasis on fresh plant material; no artificial material is permitted in any exhibit in any Division.
12. Each exhibitor is limited to one entry per class, except in the Horticulture Division.
13. The Dallas Council of Garden Clubs will strive to assure the safety of all items after arrival and placement but, is not responsible for any loss or damage to exhibits.
14. For all advance registration for **Design exhibits** see the Design Chairman for your particular design. Contact information for Chairmen is on page four (4). Design Chairman will provide entry cards.
15. Division Chairman will have entry tags for all other **exhibits**. Chairman contact information is on page four (4). Tags must be filled in prior to show.
16. For the Texas policy concerning use of state’s native plants, noxious plants and those on conservation list see page five (5).

AWARDS

The NGC Standard System of Awarding is used in all divisions.

1. Only one (1) first place (blue) ribbon per class or subclass; must score 90 points or more.
2. Only one (1) second place (red) ribbon per class or subclass; must score 85 points or more.
3. Only one (1) third place (yellow) ribbon per class or subclass; must score 80 points or more.
4. One (1) or more Honorable Mention (White) ribbons as merited; must score 75 points or more.
5. Additional NGC Top Exhibitor Awards may be offered in each division. Only one Section Award per section. Winner must be a blue ribbon scoring 95 or above and correctly named in the entire Horticulture Division.
6. There must be a minimum of Three (3) classes with at least four exhibits in each class for each award offered.
7. Judges may withhold any Top Design Award if no exhibit meets the requirements.
8. The Schedule identifies the Divisions and Sections in which each award is offered according to the rules in the *Handbook for Flower Shows*, revised 1017, 2nd edition.

TOP DIVISION/SECTION AWARDS OFFERED:

1. Division I - Design
 - a. Division Award: Award of Design Excellence. One Award of Design Excellence may be offered to the highest scoring Blue ribbon (95+) in the entire Standard Flower Show entered by an individual provided all requirements are met. Award is a rosette of Gold ribbons.
 - b. Section Awards: One (1) Designers Choice award, A rosette of purple ribbons awarded to the highest scoring exhibit scoring 95 or above entered by an individual meeting all sections requirements in Section A. All plant materials must be fresh, dried and/or treated.
 - c. One (1) Table Artistry Award, A rosette of burgundy ribbons awarded to the highest scoring exhibit scoring 95 or above entered by an individual, meeting all section requirement in section B, the Table Artistry Section. Must have 4 exhibits per class. Some plant materials must be used.
2. Division II – Horticulture
 - a. Division Award: Award of Horticultural Excellence. One Award of Horticulture Excellence, a rosette of green, orange, and blue ribbons is given to the highest scoring exhibit scoring 95 or above that is judged to be the finest in the entire Horticultural Division, provided all requirements have been met. The winning exhibit may also have won another top exhibitor award in the Horticulture Division.
 - b. Section Awards: Six (6) Awards of Merit, rosettes of orange ribbons for sections with all cut non-woody specimens including vines, will be given to the highest scoring blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or above, correctly named, and meeting all section requirements in Sections A, B, C, D, E, and F.
 - c. Section Awards: Two (2) Arboreal Awards, rosettes of green ribbons for sections of cut woody specimens, will be given to the highest scoring blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or above, correctly named, and meeting all section requirements in Sections G and H.

AWARDS (continued)

- d. Section Awards: Five (5) Growers Choice Awards, a rosette of dark green ribbons, will be given to all container-grown non-Arboreal plants or combination plantings to the highest scoring blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or above, correctly named, and meeting all section requirements in Sections J, K, L, M and N.
4. Division III – Botanical Arts (Artistic Crafts and Photography). Each section must consist of at least three (3) classes with four (4) exhibits in each class. Each exhibit must be the work of one individual.
 - a. Section Award: One (1) Botanical Arts – Artistic Crafts Award. A rosette of blue ribbons awarded to highest scoring blue ribbon exhibit of 95+ entered by an individual meeting all section requirements in Section A. Judged with Scale of Artistic Crafts Points.
 - b. Section Award: One (1) Botanical Arts – Photography. A rosette of black and white ribbons awarded to highest scoring blue ribbon exhibit of 95+ entered by an individual meeting all section requirements in Section B. Judged with the Photography Scale of Points.
 5. Division IV – Education Division Award:
Award of Appreciation, may be given



DIVISION I. Design

“Winter Fest”

Rules for Design Exhibits

1. **“The NGC Exhibit Policies are printed in the *Handbook for Flower Shows*, Chapter 7, Exhibiting in the Design Division, NGC Policies and Guidelines.”**
2. Advance registration with the Design Chairman required in all design classes by November 20, 2022. Registration for each design must be made with the appropriate Section Chairman, If an exhibitor is unable to provide an exhibit, he/she is expected to find a substitute and notify the section chairman.
3. Plant material and non-plant material permitted and not permitted in the Design Division are printed in the *Handbook for flower Show*, Chapter 7. Embellishment of dried plant material is permitted.
4. The exhibitor is required to conform to the stated description and limitations of the Design type if named in the class.
5. Rules for Design Types, Advanced Design types, Table Designs and Table Appointments are printed in the *Handbook for Flower Shows*. Chapter 7.
6. All design entries must arrive **completed** and be placed by the exhibitor on Thursday December 1 by 9:30 a.m. in space reserved with exhibitor’s name.
7. Designer is on his/her honor that the design being entered has not been previously entered or judged in an NGC Standard Flower Show. Design Chairman will place entry cards at the show to designate exhibit space.
8. All entry cards **MUST** be initialed by the Design Classification Committee to Certify adherence to this Schedule before the exhibitor is free to leave the showroom.
9. An Exhibitor may enter as many classes as desired, but only one exhibit per class.
10. Exhibitors in **Section A. must** create of design in the style indicated in class description and must contain fresh or dried materials. No artificial plant materials are allowed. **Refer to the *NGC Handbook for Flower Shows* pages 71 – 73** for further information.
11. **All plant material used in the design must be identified on a 3”x 5” card provided by the exhibitor and included with the entry tag.**
12. Non-Plant Materials are **permitted** if they add interest and are not specifically prohibited by State or Federal regulations, such as feathers, antlers, coral, or manufactured or crafted simulations of birds or animals. Plant material need not have been grown by designer.
13. Special lighting, not requiring an electrical source is permitted.
14. All staging properties will be supplied by the exhibitor.
15. **Not Permitted** items are: American and other national flags, Religious symbols, or living, or taxidermal representations of the animal kingdom.
16. The Scales of points for Design are located in Chapter 14 of the *Handbook for Flower Shows*.
17. Designs must be the work of one (1) individual. Exhibitor has freedom of choice with plant material and components.

“Winter Fest”

Section A. Designers Choice Award

“Frosty Mornings”

Eligible for the Award of Design Excellence and Designers Choice Award

Make a reservation with ?

Exhibitor has freedom of choice with plant materials and components. Designs to be staged on a white covered 72” rectangular table situated in front of a white wall. Staging panel and underlay to be furnished by exhibitor. Dimensions not to exceed 36” high, 24” wide and 20” deep. 3” x 5” card with title and description of design and names of plants is required. Four (4) entries per class.

Class 1. “Dancing Snowflakes”

A Creative Design representing exhibitor’s interpretation of the theme and class title. Dimensions not to exceed 36” high, 24” wide and 20” deep. 3” x 5” card with title and description and listing of plants is required. Four (4) entries per class.

Class 2. “Frosted Branches”

A Creative Design using techniques representing the exhibitor’s interpretation of the class theme. Dimensions not to exceed 36” high, 24” wide and 20” deep. 3”x 5” card with title and description and listing of plants is required. Four (4) entries per class.

Class 3 “Icicles”

Abstract Design in which there is a dominance of components chosen for their non-naturalistic characteristics representing the exhibitor’s interpretation of class title. Dimensions not to exceed 36” high, 24” wide and 20” deep. 3” x 5” card with title and description and listing of plants is required. Four (4) entries per class.

Design Section and Classes (Continued)

Section B. Table Artistry Award

“Winter Carnival”

Eligible for the Award of Design Excellence and the Table Artistry Award.

Make a reservation with Design Chairman, Page four (4) of this schedule.

Designer has complete freedom to select components (no flatware allowed.) A **complete Design** is required in Functional Tables and Trays.

Class 4. “Children’s Party”

Functional Table set for two persons. Staged on a 36” square table with floor length white tablecloth supplied by the committee. Overlay allowed. Must include a 3” x 5” card with title and interpretation of theme, and a listing of plant material. Four (4) entries per class.

Class 5. “Afternoon Tea”

Tea Tray for one person staged on a 1/4 of a 72” rectangular table covered with a white cloth. Tray should be ready for service of food. Appropriate scale of components for limited size of tray. Ease of service is important. Include a 3” x 5” card with the title explanation and a listing of plant material. Four (4) entries per class.

Class 6. “Evening Soiree”

Exhibition Table created artistically to suggest the service of drink/food, with no requirement as to the type or number of table appointments. Staged on one half of a 72” rectangular table covered with a white cloth. Exhibitor will supply the staging panel and underlay. Some plant material is required. Include a 3” x 5” card with the title, explanation and a listing of plant material. Four (4) entries per class.



DIVISION II. Horticulture

“Winter Village”

Horticulture Rules

1. The NGC Exhibit Policies are printed in the *Handbook for Flower Shows*, Chapter 6, Exhibiting in the Horticulture Division.
2. All entries are to be labeled by genus, specific epithet, cultivar and /or variety or patented/trade-marked names. Common names may also be given.
3. The rules for a single species cut or container-grown specimen are listed in the *Handbook For Flower Shows* or its supplement *Horticulture Exhibiting and Judging*.
4. All plant material must be fresh and have been grown by the exhibitor.
5. Annuals, Herbaceous Perennials, and House Plants must have been possessed by the exhibitor for at least 90 days. **EXCEPTION:** no minimum for early maturing seeds and/or transplants. Arboreal (woody ornamentals) must have been possessed by exhibitor for 6 months. Combination plantings must have been grown together by the exhibitor for 6 weeks.
6. To receive an NGC Top Exhibitor Award, the exhibitor must identify his/her entry by its **binomial name or currently acceptable scientific designation**. (Consult *Handbook for Flower shows*, Exhibiting in the Horticulture Division, Chapter 6.)
7. Entry Cards are to be filled out with **Pencil in advance** if possible. Exhibitor may use return address labels. Refer to Chapter 6 in the *Handbook for Flower Shows* for correctly filled out entry card.
8. Cut specimens should not have foliage below the waterline, except for gladiolus. Exhibitor will supply the containers and they **must** use clear colorless containers.
9. If wedging of stem is needed, use plant-based material, such as celery, or a wood chip.
10. If a plant is considered a flowering plant, it should be exhibited as a flowering specimen. Foliage plants may flower but, should be exhibited as foliage plants if they are grown for their leaves.
11. Specimens with a class designation in the schedule may not be entered in the ‘Any Other Worthy Class.
12. Double-potting is allowed for all potted plants.
13. The Horticulture Classification Committee Chairman and or General show Chairman are free to subdivide classes by color, form, size, cultivar, variety or other distinguishing characteristics.

Exception: Dwarf and miniature varieties which must be marked. Subdivided according to species, color, variety.

Class 39. Broadleaf evergreen trees.

Class 40. Deciduous trees.

Class 41. Fruited or flowering trees. (Must show fruit, berries, etc.)

Class 42. Needled evergreen trees.

Section I. Miscellaneous Cut Specimens

“Snow Flurries”

Eligible for the Award of Horticultural Excellence

Class 43. Any worthy cut specimens not provided for in the schedule, subdivided by variety.

“Container Grown Plants”

Section J. Container Grown Flowering Plants

“Festive Decor”

Eligible for the Award of Horticultural Excellence and Grower’s Choice Awards

Classified by type, size and growth pattern. Sub-classed by genus, cultivar or variety; sub-classed by container size “a” 6” or smaller “b” larger than 6” Must be flowering.

Double potting of containers is allowed.

“Grinch”

No container larger than 10 inches. Classed by genus, cultivar or variety. Double potting allowed.

Only one exhibit per person in each class.

Class 64. *Echinocactus* (golden barrel cactus, devil’s head cactus, cotton top cactus, horse crippler cactus, giant barrel cactus)

Class 65. *Echinocereus* (king cup cactus, lace hedgehog cactus, scarlet hedgehog cactus, nylon hedgehog cactus, subinermis cactus)

Class 66. *Mammillaria* (spomy pincushion, golden lace cactus, silken pincushion cactus, twin spooned cactus, biznaguita cactus, fishhook cactus)

A Grouping of three (3) or more botanically different plants with similar cultural requirements such as light, water and humidity. All plants must be named on entry cards (HB page 59). Container no larger than 12”. **Natural** accessories such as rocks, permitted in all combination plantings except planters. Must be in scale with plantings and container, and theme appropriate to the plants. **Fairy Gardens are not permitted.**

Class 70. Dish Garden: miniature landscape in an open, flat container..

Class 71. Planter: not a landscape, **no accessories permitted.** Compatible plants grown together for interest and beauty.

Class 72. Terrarium: miniature landscape in a transparent container.

DIVISION III. BOTANICAL ARTS

“Dazzling Snow”

Rules for Botanical Arts - Artistic Crafts

Eligible for Botanical Arts Artistic Crafts Award if all requirements are met.

The rules for Botanical Arts Artistic Crafts are printed in the *Handbook for Flower Shows*, Chapter 10.

Preregister your exhibit with the Chairman of the Botanical Arts -Artistic Crafts Division, by November 20, 2022. A **3”x 5” card must accompany the exhibit** with the title of design. Each class **must** have four (4) exhibits to qualify for the Botanical Arts Design Award. That award is a rosette of yellow and orange ribbons to the top blue ribbon 95+ winner.

1. Exhibit must contain some fresh and/or dried plant material as printed in Chapter 10 of the *Handbook for Flower Shows*, only dried plant material may be treated.
2. No artificial, endangered or locally invasive plant material may be used
3. A 3” x 5” card listing all plant material used in all artistic craft entries is required.
4. No artificial plant material is permitted in any exhibit.
5. The exhibit must be the work of one (1) individual.
6. Must have 4 exhibits in each class to be eligible for award.
7. Judged by the Artistic Crafts Scale of Points listed in the *Handbook for Flower Shows*, Chapter 14.

A. Botanical Arts - Artistic Crafts Sections and Classes “Winter Sparkle”

Eligible for Botanical Arts Artistic Crafts Award (if all requirements are met.)

All exhibits must be preregistered with the Artistic Crafts Chairman by Nov 20, 2022.

All Artistic Crafts exhibits **must** attach 3x5 inch cards with plant materials used.

Class 1. Dried Flower Pictures

“Colorful Visions”

Exhibited on Tables covered with white tablecloths. Exhibit space is 20” x 20”. Four (4) exhibits per class. Exhibitor must supply small easel for 9”x 12” picture.

Class 2. Brooches

“Sparkling Snow”

Items must be ready-to-wear with fasteners, clasps, etc., as needed. Non-plant material may be used for construction but must not show. Non-plant material such as paint may be used for coloring seeds, etc. Plant material may not be carved into figural forms; however, such forms may be assembled from plant material. Clipping, cutting or shaping of material is allowed. Exhibited on table covered with white tablecloth. Staging will be in a 3.5”x 3.5” velvet lined box supplied by Committee. **Exhibitor must supply a 3” x 5” card with an example of each flower, seed, stem, leaf or other plant material used in their exhibit.**



Class 3. Fascinator Hat

“Ice Sculptures”

A small formal headpiece. A type of formal headwear worn as an alternative to the hat. A decorative design emphasizing flowers attached to a band or clip. To be displayed on a foam head, supplied by the committee on a table covered with a white tablecloth. **Must include plant material.** Attach a 3x5inch card with plant material used.



B. Botanical Arts – Photography

“Freeze the Day”

Rules for Botanical Arts – Photography

1. The rules for Botanical arts Photography are printed in the *Handbook for Flower shows*, Chapter 10.
2. All exhibits must relate to horticulture, gardening, design or other NGC goals, objectives and/or initiatives (landscape, conservation, civic projects, preservation, ecology, environment, etc.)
3. Image must be mounted on a light -weight stiff card stock or thin foam board. Must be matted; no frame allowed
4. Minimum print size is 5 by7 inches. The maximum allowed mounted or matted size is 8 by 10 inches due to limited showroom space.
5. Photographs will be displayed on a black 3’ by 6’ free standing panel.
6. Exhibitors are encouraged to label photographed plant material, preferably with current scientific designation.
7. Judging panel of three (3) may consist of one (1) NGC Accredited Judge and two (2) recognized photography experts such as qualified photography judges, photography instructors, photography professionals or museum curators; or three (3) recognized photography experts. All judges decisions are final.
8. All entries must be the work of the exhibitor and must not have won a previous award.
9. Exhibits are judged by the Photography Scale of Points.
- 10 . Not eligible for exhibiting credit.

Division IV. Education

Education Rules

“Flying Snowflakes”

1. Education Exhibits may be the work of more than one individual or organization unless a Student Judge or an Accredited Judge is seeking exhibiting credit for preparing an education exhibit.
2. A table 6’ long and 3’ feet wide with a white tablecloth will be provided by the Committee. Exhibitor may provide their own under lament. Minimum of 18 feet.
3. Some plant material is encouraged, but not mandatory. No artificial plant material is allowed in the exhibit.
4. Exhibits are not competitive.
5. The purpose of the Education Division is to inform members and the public about goals and objectives of NGC.

Education Exhibits

“ Flying Snowflakes”

Eligible for the Award of Appreciation, a rosette of Pink ribbons will be awarded. Education Exhibits must be preregistered by November 20, with the Chairman for Education Exhibits,
All Exhibits must be in place by 9:30 a.m. on Monday December 1.

Definitions

Abstract Design – Design in which there is a dominance of components chosen for their non-naturalistic character and /or components organized in a non-realistic, non- naturalistic manner.

Annual - A plant which completes it's life cycle in one growing season.

Conformance – Adherence to schedule requirements.

Design – The organization of the Elements of Design (color, form, light, line, pattern, size, space and texture) according to the Principles of Design (balance, contrast, dominance, proportion, rhythm and scale) into a composition having beauty, distinction, expression and harmony. A design may consist of a single unit or units, with or without other components, artistically combined.

Exhibition Table – Tangible material of which a design is composed; plant material, container, special staging and mechanics. Optional components are accessories, featured objects and bases.

Dried Plant Material – Plant material from which moisture has been removed, either naturally or by mechanical means. May not be exhibited in the Horticulture Division.

Dwarf – A plant which has a height that is shorter than normal.

Foliage Plant – Plant that is grown or exhibited for the beauty of its foliage. Flowers may be present, but are inconspicuous or of minor importance.

Fresh plant material – Living plants or any parts thereof. Horticulture Division **must** consist of all fresh plant material.

Functional Table – A mode of table classes in the NGC Flower Show, planned and set for actual service of food.

Growing Medium – The material in which plants are grown such as soil, soil-less mixes, water, bark, moss, etc.

Herb – A group of plants whose leaves, flowers, seeds, roots and/or bark can be used for medicine, flavor, fragrance, and/or dyes.

Point Scoring – Evaluating an exhibit using a specific Scale or Points based on perfection.

Staging Panel – Upright surface placed behind a design to enhance a design. May be the Frame of Reference or incorporated into the design depending on the Schedule Requirements.

Taxidermic Animal – A prepared, stuffed and mounted skin of a dead animal in life-like state, not permitted in the Design Division of an NGC Flower Show.

Topiary – Botanical Arts: The art of crafting a stylized tree from plant and non-plant material.

Treated Plant Materia – Plant material whose exterior appearance has been artificially altered by a substance such as dye, paint, glycerin, etc. Only dried plant material may be treated.

The Purpose of a Flower show is: To educate club members and the viewing public; To stimulate interest in horticulture and floral design; To provide an outlet for creative expression; and To convey to the community, Objectives of NGC.
